WHO ARE WE?

Santa Cruz County Fire Department is your local fire department committed to serving the citizens and visitors of Santa Cruz County. The Department responded to **2,785 incidents in 2009** within its 286 square mile area and is staffed year-round with CAL FIRE career staff and County Fire volunteer personnel.

Today, with over **60 years of service**, the Santa Cruz County Fire Department includes a combination of County, State, and Volunteer fire stations and resources.



LOCAL AGREEMENT

Santa Cruz County Fire Department was established in 1948 when the Board of Supervisors entered into a cooperative agreement with the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE) to provide fire protection in the rural and remote areas of Santa Cruz County.



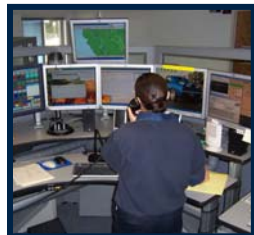
Because of this agreement, County Fire is able to access the vast resources and benefits that the state has to offer while maintaining local control. This results in improved local/state governmental teamwork as well as maintaining or improving community insurance service ratings.



WHAT WE DO...

Responding to all types of emergencies on a daily basis is the role of the CAL FIRE/County Fire workforce. The services and programs provided under the cooperative agreement include:

- Structure and Wildland Fire Protection
- First Responder Emergency Medical Services
- Automobile Accidents (*Including Highways 1, 9, 17, and 152*)
- Hazardous Material Response
- Natural Disasters
- Search and Rescue
- Fire Department Administration
- Public Safety Fire Education
- Fire Prevention and Inspection Services
- Career and Volunteer Firefighter Training and Recruitment
- Law Enforcement and Investigation Services
- Resource Management/Vegetation Management Program
- CAL FIRE Emergency Command Center (Felton ECC) is responsible for answering 911 calls and dispatching fire/emergency resources for CAL FIRE/County Fire.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

Santa Cruz County Fire Department is under the operational supervision and administration of CAL FIRE's San Mateo and Santa Cruz Unit Chief. Services are provided from 10 fire stations staffed with a combination of career and volunteer firefighters. 5 volunteer companies protect their local communities and constitute the majority of County Fire's staff. They are essential to its successful operation.

Per the Cooperative Agreement, Santa Cruz County provides funding for emergency response in its rural and remote areas for 7 months of the year (November through May). During declared fire season, typically June through October, CAL FIRE provides this same protection at no cost to the County as part of its State-mandated responsibilities.
